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Steve Packwood Takes War At Sea Crown at the WBC

Steve Packwood of Eagan, MN won the 2011 War At Sea Championship on Thursday, August 4 with a record of 6-2-0. This was Steve's 2nd War At Sea championship – the other was in 1996! Steve defeated **Charlie Drozd** of Vernon Hills, IL (6-1-1) in the final. Charlie was also runner-up in Victory in the Pacific, narrowly failing to become the first player ever to win both events at the same con. **Andy Choptiany** of Philadelphia, PA, repeated as 3rd place finisher with a 4-2-1 tally and **Dennis Nicholson** of Pawling, NY nabbed the 4th and final plaque with a 4-3-0 log. **Pat Richardson** (Warrenton, VA/4-1-1) finished 5th and received a copy of the book The German Navy at War: Vol. 1, The Battleships, given to the highest finisher not winning a plaque. The remaining playoff contenders were 6th, **Bruce Monnin** (Minster, OH), who had a 4-2-0 mark, 7th, **Jonathan Lockwood** (Reston, VA/4-2-0) and 8th, **Ray Freeman** (Berkeley, CA/3-3-0). Rounding out our top 10 were **Jim Kramer** (Wiconisco, PA, 3-2-0) in 9th place at 3-2-0, and **Chuck Stapp** (Freehold, NJ) 10th place.

36 players opened the competition shortly after 9 AM on tournament day. As usual, eligibility for the majority of the playoff spots came down to Round 5, 8 hours later. At the end of 4 rounds, **Bruce Monnin** (4-0-0, 40 VPs to that point), **Charlie Drozd** (3-0-1, 35 VPs), and **Pat Richardson**, (3-0-1, 33 VPs) had clinched playoff slots, with 11 other competitors vying for the remaining 5 openings. With only bragging rights at issue, Bruce and Charlie played, with Charlie's Axis ending Bruce's win streak by 8.5 POC. Bruce's Allies had bid 1.5. The next board featured **Pat Richardson** (3-0-1, 33 VPs) vs. **Chuck Stapp** (3-1-0, 30 VPs). Chuck took the Allies for 2.5 but Pat's Axis came out on top by 4.5. Veterans **Jim Kramer** (3-1-0, 30 VPs) and **Jonathan Lockwood** (3-1-0, 28 VPs) faced off, with Jonathan's Allies, bidding 2.5, surviving heavy damage to get the convoys through and prevail. **Andy Choptiany's** (2-1-1, 25 VPs) Allies, bidding 2.5, reversed his 2010 playoff defeat by the GM's (3-1-0, 28 VPs) Axis, pulling away for a 5.5 POC win. **Steve Packwood** (2-2-0, 24 VPs) took on **Rob Drozd** (2-1-1, 23 VPs); Steve's Allies bid 1.0 and cruised to a 7 POC win. Next, **Dennis Nicholson** (2-2-0, 22 VPs) opposed **Scott Beall** (2-2-0, 20 VPs). Dennis's Axis broke the Allied blockade and won areas on turns 7 and 8 to win by 3.5 POC after the Allied bid of 2.5. Finally, former champs **Ray Freeman** and **John Sharp** (both with 2-2-0 marks and 20 VPs) sat opposite from each other, with Ray's Allies, bidding 1.5, on top at the end.

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2011 Tournament Recap (continued)

At the conclusion of the Round 5 games, the first 7 playoff slots were set, leaving a tiebreaker to determine the 8th and final contender. **Charlie Drozd** led the way with a 4-0-1 mark and 45 VPs, closely followed by **Pat Richardson** with an identical 4-0-1 record but 43 VPs. **Bruce Monnin** ranked 3rd with 40 VPs and a 4-1-0 log. The next 4 were 4th, **Jonathan Lockwood** (4-1-0, 38 VPs), 5th, **Andy Choptiany** (3-1-1, 35 VPs), 6th, **Steve Packwood** (3-2-0, 34 VPs), and 7th, **Dennis Nicolson** at 3-2-0 and 32 VPs. **Ray Freeman** narrowly edged **Jim Kramer** and **Chuck Stapp** for playoff slot #8 on a strength of schedule tiebreaker; all 3 had 3-2-0 finishes with 30 VPs. Ray demonstrated the virtue of perseverance by making the elite 8 the hard way, winning his last 3 games after dropping the first 2. **Charlie Drozd**, **Andy Choptiany**, and **Jonathan Lockwood** repeated from last year's playoffs; Jonathan has made the playoffs 4 years in a row, the first and only player to do so.

In the quarterfinals, top seed **Charlie Drozd**'s Axis knocked off #8 **Ray Freeman**'s Allies, bidding 2.5, by 8.5 POC. The key battle took place in the Barents on turn 4, where the Axis sank 4 Allied cruisers, 2 battleships, and a convoy. #7 seed **Dennis Nicholson** (Axis) upset #2 **Pat Richardson** (Allies, 2.5) by 7.5 POC with a similar key battle in the Barents, this one on turn 2, where the Axis sank a carrier, 2 BBs, and 7 CAs without any losses. In a 3rd game hinging on a key battle in the Barents, #6 **Steve Packwood** bested #3 **Bruce Monnin** when Bruce's Allied battlecruisers failed their speed rolls on turn 1 and an Allied disaster ensued. The Allied bid of 2 pushed the final margin to 9 POC. The 4th quarterfinal was the day's closest playoff game; #5 **Andy Choptiany**'s Allies, bidding 2.5, squeaked past #4 **Jonathan Lockwood**'s Axis by a half POC. The game came down to the final turn when the Axis needed their U-boats to decontrol 2 sea areas but could only do so in one. To avoid a rematch, the semifinals matched #1 **Charlie Drozd** and #7 **Dennis Nicholson** while #5 **Andy Choptiany** faced #6 **Steve Packwood**. Charlie's Axis overcame Dennis' Allies, bidding 2.0, despite the first 9 Allied ASW sinking all 7 Axis U-boats. Meanwhile, Steve's Axis prevailed over Andy's Allies, bidding 2.5.

Charlie Drozd, playing in his first final, took the Allies for a 2.0 bid. **Steve Packwood** was playing in his third. On turn 1 the Axis sailed for the South Atlantic and won the area, but did so with 2 German vessels crippled and disabled and 2 others having failed oiling rolls. On turn 4 the Axis won a big battle in the Barents and dispatched a convoy in the process. The keys to the game occurred on turn 7, when 8 Allied ASW rid an area of 7 U-boats -- but Axis LBA sank the last convoy to save the game. The Allied bid of 2 converted a 1-POC Allied victory to a 1-POC Axis victory. Congratulations again to 2011 champ **Steve Packwood**!

Entrants (42) and games played (76) in this, the 20th anniversary competition, were down slightly from last year. For the 8th year in a row, no chess clock expired. And finally, regarding awards, **Charlie Drozd** copped Best Axis Player with a 5-0-1 scoreboard, edging **Steve Packwood** at 4-2-0, while **Jonathan Lockwood** took Best Allied Player honors at 4-1-0 topping the GM at 3-0-0 and **Ray Freeman** at 3-1-0. Jonathan has now won Best Allied Player laurels an unprecedented 6 times, at the WBC and BPA Championship tourneys. **Jim Fardette**, a veteran gamer playing in his first War At Sea tourney, was Rookie of the year with a 2-0-1 mark and 12th place finish. **Rob Drozd** was our sportsmanship nominee. Facing a very young player in a competitive situation, he chose to make the game a learning experience for his opponent.

I look forward to seeing you all next year! I don't foresee any significant format alterations. I would like to see us conduct a demo, so we can make War At Sea an A level event. Unfortunately I do not have time to do it myself due to GMing a second event. If pedagogy is your thing, let me know.

Competition and Strategy; Play Balance and Bidding

Earlier this year I read about a baseball manager who said, roughly, you're going to win a third of your games no matter what you do and you're going to lose a third of your games no matter what you do. Your ability comes into play in the remaining third of your games. As soon as I read that, I knew that that was a perfect description for War At Sea. Once you've played enough War At Sea, the dice dictate that you're going to win a third no matter what and lose a third no matter what. How well you play the other third of the games determines how good a player you are. Because 2/3rds of the games are essentially out of your hands (over time, of course), some outside critics subject our game to the sobriquets "Yahtzee At Sea" or "Dice At Sea." Instead, this maxim illustrates why no current active player has a lifetime winning percentage of 70% -- yet, a former competitor, **Andy Maly**, happened by the standings board at the end of the tournament and astutely observed that "I still see the same names at the top of the standings most of the time."

As has been the case recently, the predominant Allied opening strategy this year was Barents on 1; the GM is aware of only one game in which the Allies utilized Barents on 2 and none in which the Mediterranean strategy was used. Of course, there may have been others not noted on the game slips. I do not have statistics on Axis responses, but observed turn 1 forays into the Barents, North Atlantic, and South Atlantic in equal abundance, plus some occasions where the entire German fleet stayed in the Baltic.

Last year the Axis won 51.2% of the games played, the most in 7 years. Allied supremacy returned this year. The Allies won 43 games (56.6%) and the Axis 30 (39.5%) and there were 3 ties (3.9%). The average bid this year was 1.51 (all games) and 1.72 (games with a bid). Here's a breakdown:

For the first time that I'm aware of, the Allied win percentage decreased in direct relation to the size of the Allied bid. Usually, the Allies win the highest percentage of games with no bid and the lowest percentage of games with the highest bid, but there are anomalies in between. Not this year. The perfect correlation may be a statistical freak for this year only, but it does illustrate that bids achieve the goal of leveling the playing field. As always, there are slight differences of opinion among players as to precisely what the right bid should be, but that's part of the fun of the competition.

Bidding influenced the outcome directly in 18 games, almost a quarter of all the games played, both the largest absolute number and the highest percentage ever. 3 Allied wins became ties (the most on record), 2 ties became Axis wins, and 3 Allied wins became Axis wins after the bid was taken into account. On top of that, 6 Axis wins by less than 2 POC became Axis victories by 2 POC or more (another record), and 4 Allied wins by 2 POC or more converted to Allied wins by less than 2 POC (still another record). Keep in mind also that both of this year's finalists, **Charlie Drozd** and **Steve Packwood**, won most of their games as the Axis. In addition, the Axis won 6 of this year's 7 playoff games, each of which featured a bid of 2.0 or 2.5.

As always, putting on the War At Sea tournament is a team effort, starting with Assistant Gamemasters **Rob Drozd**, **Ewan McNay**, and **John Sharp**; John also provided the chess clocks, with an assist from **Charlie Drozd**. Thanks also to **Ken Nied**, who volunteered to be the odd man out for the final round. My opponents, **Jim Kramer**, **Dennis Nicholson**, **Bruce Monnin**, **Steve Packwood**, and **Andy Choptiany**, friends all, played quickly and set up the game afterwards, allowing me to attend to my GM duties. I didn't qualify for the real playoffs this year, so I considered the Swiss rounds to be my own private playoffs, in which I faced 4 of the 8 actual playoff contenders (3 of the 4 semifinalists), my 5th opponent missed the playoffs by a tiebreaker.

Tournament Notes and Statistics

Steve Packwood, Chuck Stapp, and Tim Hitchings played in the War At Sea tournament at the first Avaloncon tournament 20 years ago, and they were still around this year, although only Tim has played at least one game in every event....**Chuck Stapp** was the only player to play all his games on one side of the board, Allies in this case....Only one player this year managed the dubious distinction of winning all his games playing one side while losing all his games on the other side: yours truly (Axis 0-2, Allies 3-0)....Welcome first time-competitors **Ben Collinson, Andrew Doughan, Jim Fardette, Jeff Miller, and Randy Schilb**; we hope to see you again....Welcome back returnees **Scott Beall, Greg Berry, Ted Drozd, Bruce Monnin, Ken Nied, and John Selders**....Scott, Ted, and Bruce skipped only last year, while John we haven't seen since 1993!....The **Drozds**, dad **Rob** and sons **Charlie & Ted**, won the Family War At Sea event going away, besting brothers **Joe & Ben Collinson** and the father-son duo of **James & Andrew Doughan**....**Jim Kramer** clearly had the day's toughest slate of opponents, playing seed nos. 1, 2, 5, and 8....4 players **Charlie Drozd (2), Daniel Blumentritt (19), Randy MacInnis (23), and James Doughan (25)**, had personal best finishes....Only one player, obviously, can win the War at Sea championship in a year, but our competitors didn't let the fact that somebody else got the 1st place plaque stop them from winning other events; no fewer than 9 of our entrants took home championship wood elsewhere, including **Richard Beyma, James Doughan, Rob Drozd, Ted Drozd, Bryan Eshleman, Ewan McNay, and Joe Powell**.

21 years of War At Sea tournaments have included 8 Avaloncons, 13 WBCs, 41 PBEM Ladder Rounds, and 8 BPA PBEM Championships....Of the 2,958 games contested so far, the Allies have won 1,473 (51.2%) to the Axis' 1,332 (46.3%), with 72 ties (2.5%) and 81 games without information....There have been 1,575 tilts with an Allied bid (57.4%) and 156 featuring Axis bids (5.7%); there was no bid in 1,012 games (36.9%) and we lack details for 215 games....The 5 best career tournament War At Sea winning percentages belong to 1) **David Finberg**, 2) **Tom Scarborough**, 3) **Phil Rennert**, 4) **Jonathan Lockwood**, and 5) **Glenn McMaster**.... The 5 top Axis records belong to 1) **David Finberg**, 2) **Tim Tow**, 3) **Glenn McMaster**, 4) **Karl Bodenheimer** (who plays only by e-mail), and 5) **Rob Flowers**....Heading the Allied charts are (tied) **John Elliott** and **Mircea Pauca** (another e-mail only player), followed by 3) **Bruce Reiff**, 4) **Ray Freeman**, and 5) **Phil Rennert**.... **Ewan McNay** has the best record in WBC/Avaloncon games, **Andy Gardner** the best PBEM Ladder winning percentage, and **Jonathan Lockwood** the top log in BPA PBEM Championship contests....**Jonathan Lockwood** has played the most tournament games, 178, and has the most total victories (118) and Allied wins (94); **Bruce Monnin** has the most Axis wins (57) and WBC/Avaloncon triumphs (63)....**Ray Freeman, Jonathan Lockwood, Ed Menzel, and Pat Richardson** lead with 7 playoff appearances apiece.
